

While men lost more jobs than women in the Great Recession (December 2007 – June 2009), they are gaining more jobs in the subsequent recovery, even relative to the number they lost. According to the establishment payroll data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, men lost six million jobs between December 2007 and January 2010 (the trough of men's employment); from January 2010 to April 2011, 24 percent (1.4 million) of the jobs men lost were regained. Women lost 2.7 million jobs between December 2007 and September 2010 (the trough for women's employment); only 14 percent (371,000) of the jobs women lost were regained as of April 2011. In part, the poor performance of the labor market for women reflects recent job losses in the public sector (IWPR # Q001 Women and Men in the Public Sector).
